

## DISCUSSION ESSAY STRUCTURE

A discussion essay looks at a problem from different angles. It has a clearly formulated research question and a number of possible answers.

In the conclusion, you may conclude that one answer is superior, or that the issue is complicated and needs to be investigated further.

# CHOOSING YOUR RESEARCH QUESTION & ANSWERS

### **RESEARCH QUESTION**

This is the question you are trying to answer. It should not be too broad - try to be specific enough so that everyone understands what you mean.

**Clear and focused:** Is social media use making teenagers depressed?

**Open but still possible:** How is social media affecting teenagers' mental health.

**Too vague and open:** Is social media ruining society?

### **ANSWERS**

Find two to four answers that give interesting perspectives. If there are opposing facts or opinions, make sure you make room for both.

### **HOW TO ORGANIZE YOUR ESSAY**

You can organize your essay in five or six paragraphs:

- 1. Introduction & research question
- 2. Answer 1
- 3. Answer 2
- 4. Answer 3
- 5. Answer 4
- 6. Conclusion: repeat your question and state whether the answer is clear or if more research is needed.
